## **Chamber Honors Top Logistics Performers at Third Annual Luncheon**

ATLANTA – The Metro Atlanta Chamber awarded the Logistics Professional of the Year award to Ann Elliott of Solertis Logistics Solutions, and the Logistics Company of the Year award to Manhattan Associates during a luncheon at the 2008 Logistics Forum.

Metro Atlanta has the fifth-largest concentration of logistics companies and employment in the country, with more than 103,000 jobs. In fact, more than 90 percent of the top 25 third-party logistics service providers have operations in Atlanta.

"The logistics industry drives metro Atlanta's economy," said Sam A. Williams, president of the Metro Atlanta Chamber of Commerce. "With its superior rail, road and air infrastructure, Atlanta continues to serve as a major gateway to U.S. markets. The logistics network is a primary competitive advantage."

Metro Atlanta continues to be a source for logistics talent and innovation that helps attract and grow companies. This is the second year for the awards, which were created to recognize outstanding individuals and companies in metro Atlanta whose actions have advanced the state of the logistics industry and promoted its continued growth. This year's theme was "Mobility in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century: The Infrastructure Challenge."

## Logistics Company of the Year, Manhattan Associates

Manhattan Associates has been providing global supply chain excellence to more than 1,200 customers worldwide for more than 18 years. They are one of only two software companies consistently profitable for the past 16 years.

Headquartered in Atlanta, Manhattan Associates are founding members of the Atlanta Logistics Innovation Council. They have endowed a professorship at Georgia Institute of Technology in the school of Industrial and Systems Engineering. They returned 17% revenue growth in both 2006 and 2007. The firm has grown from fewer than 30 in the early 1990s to 2,400 worldwide today, with 1,200 in Atlanta. *Logistics Management* named Manhattan Associates a Top 50 Logistics Provider in 2008.

Finalists for Logistics Company of the Year included CHAINalytics LLC, Coyote Logistics and RoadLink.
